Shape	A 2D outline of an object
Pattern	More than one shape, creates a pattern.
Form	A shape that is 3D

Collage	Sticking and layering paper/images
Juxtapose	Combining images/objects that are very different.
Layer	To stack
Overlap	Covering the bottom layer
Composition	Thoughtful layout/presentation
Contrast	Two things different from each other, such as light and dark
Layout	Arrangement of work
Symmetry	Even layout

Impasto	Thickly applied paint
Blended	Smoothly mixing one colour or tone into another
Limited colour palette	Reducing the range of colour
Realistic	Looks real
Zoomed in	Focused area
Enlarged	Made bigger

Viewfinder	A tool used to direct your view or focus.
2D relief	Raised surface
Mixed media	More than one medium used
Gesture	A mark that shows movement
Expression	A mark that is animated

Pastel	A soft colour, often with a lot of white in it.
Harmonious	Colours that sit next to another on the colour wheel.
Analogous	Groups of three colours that are next to each other on the colour wheel.
Spectrum	A sequence of colours, often all together.
Saturation	Strength/vibrancy of a colour.
Aquarelle	A technique of painting with thin, transparent watercolours
Opacity	The quality of lacking transparency or translucence.
Transparency	The quality of being able to see clearly through something.
Wash	A light watery layer of paint over an area.
Wax resist	Art technique layering watercolours over oil pastels.
Negative space	The name given to space around an object or intentionally left blank.

Week 5 glossary	Definition
Photoshoot	Planned session to take photographs
Thumbnail	One individual photograph in small form/preview mode.
Contact sheet	A series of thumbnails that shows an entire photoshoot sequence, start to finish.
Rule of thirds	A "rule of thumb" or guideline to help compose visual images such as designs, films, paintings, and photographs.
Foreground	The part of a view that is nearest to the observer, especially in a picture or photograph.
Background	the part of a picture, scene, or photograph that forms a setting or appears furthest from the viewer.
Focus	An image that is completely sharp is said to be in-focus. An image that's completely blurry is said to be unfocused
Macro	close-up photography of tiny insects or objects with images that result in the subject being life-size or larger

Rough	A texture that is uneven.
Coarse	A texture that is very uneven.
Smooth	A texture that is even.
Carve	To remove clay.
Wedge	Process of preparing clay to remove air pockets.
Rolling pins	A tool used to roll out clay.
Guides	Pieces of wood that ensure continuity in thickness of your slab.
Slab	A rolled-out piece of clay.
Imprint	Pressing into the clay.
Score	Technique to attach one piece of clay to another.

Highlight	The lightest and brightest point of art, painted last.
Lowligh	Core of a shadow, darkest area.

Monochromatic	Variations of one colour, often black
Chiaroscuro	Extreme shadows and piercing light
