
Our English curriculum

Year 7 - 8 have been working on personalised learning pathways based on reading ages to strengthen and challenge their reading and comprehension skills. Our red readers have been busy revisiting phonics and other key literacy skills while our amber readers have been following school Reading our Development Plan, designed to target areas that will allow them to access the wider curriculum in English and other subjects. Advanced readers in the green groups, read a novel using a 'fast read' approach, meaning they read intensively and freely – led by their teacher - to maximise their understanding of characters, themes, and story-telling techniques common to all literary fiction. This in turn has driven up reading engagement and discussion around how and why writers do what they do setting them on the right path of enquiry into other literary forms.

Year 9 are part way through reading George Orwell's seminal work, Animal Farm, a story about power and its corrupting influences on leaders as seen in the Russian Revolution which the story is a response to. In addition, some students whose reading ages indicated they may be struggling with some aspects of reading, are receiving 1-2-1 intervention three times a week for 20 minutes, to help them with this. Attendance has been good and engagement positive which bodes well for

when they tackle reading challenges independently.




Outside of the curriculum, confident readers in Year 10 have been working with reluctant readers in Year 7 once a week during form time to try and build their confidence levels and rekindle their love of books. These 'Reading Revolutionaries' are doing just that, empowering less confident readers with the

skills and self-belief that they can – and should – pick up a book and read for pleasure having proved it with their Year 10 buddy. Again, the sessions have been well attended by both parties and early signs are the Year 7s are gelling well with Year 10 in pursuit of this shared goal.

Year 10 are finishing off work on Language Paper 1 which by design will furnish them with the skills to decode texts so vital to their study of Literature texts. After half term they will be moving onto study JB Priestley's 'An Inspector Calls'.


Year 11 have been working on examination skills for Paper 1 and revisiting Literature as they prepare for their mocks. They have completed their speeches which have been a wonderful privilege to bear witness to as a teacher given the diversity of topics and the sincerity in which many of them have gone about planning and delivering them in class. A big well done to them!



The English Department's renewed focus on reading – achieved through a combination of a rich and diverse curriculum offer and interventions that put reading for meaning front and centre of our mission – means we are confident our students will benefit from the positive impact of the school's Reading Plan takes effect.

Our Design and Technology curriculum

It has been a busy couple of weeks with year 8 designing and making LED torches with Mr Lavin. Miss Kelly's textiles classes have been practising their embroidery skills by making animal puppets. Mrs Graham's Year 11 have started their practical assessments showing off everything they have learnt over the past two years. They have made pasta, bread jams and a variety of other delicacies all from scratch!

Our scientists have been busy in the labs taking part in various experiments using microscopes.








Our Computing curriculum

Year 7 have been working on their programming and coding skills during this term with Scratch programming. Pupils completed a series of tasks which developed their coding skills and then created a maze game which was controlled by the arrow keys on the keyboard. Some pupils even added levels into their game to make it harder to complete!

Year 8 have been working on a unit of work which explores photo manipulation. Pupils learnt to use a new piece of software called PhotoPea where they were able to use different images to create an advert to promote a Beatles exhibition. Pupils had to learn skills such as taking backgrounds off images, so they were able to layer them as well as learning new terminology such as rasterising images.

Year 9 have completed an Animation unit of work this term. They learnt skills in software such as Pixel Art Draw, Photo Pea and Wick Editor. Their final project was to create an animation for primary school children to promote healthy eating, using a recognisable character.









We are really excited about the Computer Science, ICT, iMedia and Business Studies trip to Disneyland Paris (25th Feb to 28th Feb). Our pupils will be attending a conference where Lady Marieme Jamme who is a familiar face to Assisi will be a guest speaker!

Our Religious Education curriculum

This term the RE department have been focussing on engaging students in effective evaluation. We have been addressing various issues using debating strategies and techniques. Mr Rice and Mr Fox have been implementing the use of 'Silent debates' in class. This sounds like a contradiction in terms however a silent debate has become a popular and enjoyable challenge for students who wish to express their views on topics such as nuclear war. There is one main rule to a silent debate, no verbal communication whatsoever.


Mr Rice's Year 7 group rose to this challenge during their silent debate titled 'should

Mr Rice and Mr Fox noted that the students excelled in their follow up evaluation questions and put this down to the quality of responses in our silent debates. Well done everyone.






Our History curriculum




Our Art curriculum

Year 7 creatives are creating artist information pages, inspired by the work of Claire Coles. After half term we will be drawing on top and adding word showers to help with vocabulary recall.

Year 8 creatives are learning about the inspirations behind the designs of Gaudi's architecture and are eagerly working towards working in clay — the first since covid restrictions.

There's a focus on literacy and oracy in year 9 creatives, looking at concentric circles and quad drawings inspired by the culture of Brazil and work of Beatrice Milhazes.

Year 10 creatives are celebrating mental health week with a little mindfulness through paper manipulation and quilling. These are



being made in preparation for mini underwater ecosystems.

Artists in Year 11 are 5 weeks into their exam. They are trying to balance researching their chosen themes with experimenting with media and ideas. There are booster sessions this week and a booster day on Tuesday 14th February to support them with their visions and intentions. Themes include layers, flight, reflection, in the news, aged and objects.

A small selection of Year 9, 10 and 11 art students will be working with LIPA graduate and production designer Laura Lomax in a light art exhibition workshop. This session will take place between 10.15am and 12.45pm on Saturday morning at LIPA on 25th February.

Our Performing Arts curriculum

It's been an exciting term in the Drama Department with visitors from The Royal Court Youth Theatre, delivering workshops to Y8, 9, 10 & 11. Pupils have been invited to attend weekly free evening classes, which have had a positive response across KS3.

Year 10 enjoyed a trip to watch the National Theatre's Touring Production of Noughts and Crosses at the Liverpool Playhouse as part of their GCSE course.

This week we welcomed the Theatre company 20 Stories High into school to perform their production 'Loops' to the whole of Y9. It

was a challenging but hopeful and empowering story exploring institutional racism, microaggressions, encounters with the police, family relationships and physical abuse.



Some of our exam classes in Y10 and Y11 contributed to the promotion of the Eurovision song contest as it prepares to invite the exciting worldwide show to the UK, appearing on BBC Breakfast, radio Merseyside and Granada TV.

Our Year 11 were very excited to perform in the Now Festival 2023 on 8th February. They devised their own performance, exploring mental health and violence prevention.



The KS3 Drama club continue to prepare their performance piece as part of the School of Sanctuary contributions. The students are working on their own performance based on the message: 'welcome'.

Year 7 star netballers into the county finals!



Our Special Educational Needs department

Our new SENsory Space on the first floor is a hive of activity and a haven for those who need it. From the beginning of the day to the end, we have students booked in to use our SENsory Circuit and our activity rooms to stimulate discussion or calm minds. Dedicated Learning Support Assistants are on hand to demonstrate how equipment works and to devise sensory circuits for students to follow, to get the best out of our new equipment. Our students are loving their time spent in the space and are very supportive of each other whilst using the equipment.

To support students with their emotional welfare and finding ways to manage the demands of young adult life, we welcomed Miss Brooks to the team as our resident Emotion Coach. We also welcome Mr Stevens as an Emotional Literacy Support Assistant (ELSA) to work alongside Mrs Dawn Defferd next term as part of the SAFE project. The ELSAs will be focusing on talking about emotions and the language of feelings so that our students can express themselves more clearly and overcome barriers to their learning.

GCSE exams - January and February

Ms Diamond, our Exams Officer would like to congratulate those students who have sat their first external exams of 22-23 academic year. They have made a great start and hopefully will carry this momentum through to their summer exams. Students should look out for their statement of entries and summer exam timetable after the half term break.



Maths and English tutoring

Mr Hepke has done a fantastic job of organising an extensive tutoring programme. Some of our students in Year 7 -10 are involved in a 15-week programme of tuition for Maths and English. They have an hour a week working in groups of three with a qualified tutor. The tutors work closely with our Maths and English teams to make sure they are supporting and stretching our students with the precise knowledge and skills they need to improve their progress.

There are currently 30 students in each of Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 completing their 15 weeks of English and 15 students in each of Year 7, 8,

9 and 10 completing their 15 weeks of Maths. The feedback from tutors and students has been extremely positive.

Some of our Year 11 students are involved in a 15 week after-school programme aimed at

boosting their grades in Maths and English. These sessions take place on a Friday after school for selected students working in small groups with their online tutor. Student engagement has been excellent.

We are running a full week of booster sessions for Year 11 over both the February half term and Easter holidays covering a whole range of subjects.



Supporting our students' mental health

This term we launched the Wellbeing Award for schools, and sent questionnaires to parents, staff and pupils.

In February we combined children's mental health awareness week and assemblies about mental health and online safety. Ms Huthwaite worked with a group of students on the launch of 'The Assisi Way Podcast.' This explores mental health and positive wellbeing strategies.




The Assisi Way

We all have experience of emotional wellbeing and mental health for mild to moderate needs in children and young people. We work directly within the school offering a range of interventions and will work with you and your child to determine the best course of action if they need some support.

This might include: 1:1 support and interventions, group work and sessions, peer mentors, supporting PHCSE lessons, assemblies on emotional wellbeing and training for teachers.

The MHIT team can also support children and young people to access other services in the city if they feel it would be more appropriate, such as YPAS, KOOTH and CAMHS.

You can also access support through the Safeguarding Team at school.


