Liverpool students shine in Eurovision's live semi-final draw

Three students from The Academy of St Francis of Assisi were specially selected to represent the city as part of BBC Two's Eurovision Song Contest handover and draw.

The live show was broadcast from St George's Hall on Tuesday 31 January and presented by Rylan Clark and AJ Odudu.

Mayor of 2022 host city Turin, Stefano Lo Russo, handed over the official keys of the Eurovision Song Contest, known as the Insignia, to the Mayor of Liverpool, Joanne Anderson.

Students from The Academy of St Francis of Assisi, Niota, Billal and Chenelle played an important role in the programme and announced the countries who have made it to the semi-finals in May, before the grand final. The students revealed the results live on stage, alongside the well-known presenters.

Before Niota revealed the successful country, AJ asked her how she felt, as a local student, about Eurovision coming to Liverpool. Niota spoke eloquently, saying: "It is a delight to show off Liverpool's diversity and an honour to present and host Eurovision on behalf of Ukraine." The Year 11 student was met with rapturous applause and proceeded to open the envelope and announce that Germany was through to the first semi-final.

Billal followed suit and announced that Ukraine was through to the second semi-final, with Chenelle revealing that Spain was also through to the second semi-final.

Earlier in the day, the students also featured on BBC Breakfast and interviewed for ITV Granada Reports and BBC Radio Merseyside. The One Show also went live to the BBC Two broadcast. This unique opportunity was brought to the Kensington-based academy, which is proudly part of All Saints Multi Academy Trust, by Culture Liverpool. Culture Liverpool recognises that The Academy of St Francis of Assisi is a 'School of Sanctuary' and plays a key role in the local community. The academy is committed to inclusivity and providing a safe space for those seeking sanctuary. Students are educated on the experiences of asylum seekers and are encouraged to build their intercultural awareness. Head of performing arts at The Academy of St Francis of Assisi, Mrs Abi Huthwaite, supported the students on the day. She said: "This was a real once in a lifetime opportunity for our brilliant students. "They carried themselves impeccably throughout the day, even though it was an early start as they were on BBC Breakfast from 7am and the Eurovision show didn't finish until 7:30pm – but they didn't let that affect them and they proved to be naturals in front of the cameras."

Ms Jo Leech, headteacher of the academy, added: "To see our students live on television throughout the day filled me with so much pride. They represented The Academy of St Francis of Assisi on a regional, national and international scale and they did it effortlessly. Well done to Niota, Billal and Chenelle!"



National Tutoring Programme benefits ASFA students

The Academy of St Francis of Assisi (ASFA) is successfully supporting students who require extra tutoring in English and maths thanks to the Government's catch-up funding, following COVID-19.

Teachers at the academy identified 15 students in each year group, from Years 7 to 10, to embark on a 15-week programme which involves external tutors coming into the school for one hour per week and working with students in small groups to help improve their reading or numeracy skills.

Now in its second year of the National Tutoring Programme, the Kensington school has seen tangible results with 80% of students now making expected, or better, progress in English or maths.

The Academy of St Francis of Assisi, which is proudly part of All Saints Multi Academy Trust, has been commended by the Department for Education for its utilisation of the catch-up funding and is set to be used as a case study demonstrating best practice.

Mr Ian Hepke, assistant headteacher at the academy, has led the programme since it was introduced in 2021.

He said: "We are overjoyed with how the National Tutoring Programme has benefited our students and it is wonderful to see how engaged they are during the sessions. The feedback has been brilliant, and every student looks forward to their tutor coming in and working with them."



One Year 8 student commented: "I am really enjoying the sessions. The tutors are helpful, and I feel like it has really helped my confidence."

Headteacher, Ms Jo Leech, said: "The funding has been a great addition in helping us address any gaps in learning for students who require extra support outside of the classroom. Our vision here at The Academy of St Francis of Assisi is 'success for all' and being part of this programmes ensures we achieve this for students of all ages and that no one gets left behind."

Testing is currently underway to gauge the progress students have made since the beginning of the process. Student voice feedback is encouraging in terms of engagement, confidence levels and enjoyment, which bodes well for some positive gains on students' reading age and ability going forward.

World Book Day on 2nd March was a great success with students getting involved in activities across different departments to celebrate the occasion. A few teachers even recorded a masked reader video with students having fun guessing both the teacher and the book.










In feminism club students have been discussing the history of female rights and how far women have come through history but also discussing modern problems that arise in society for women.

Disney Land Paris – February 23


In February, we took 33 pupils to Disney Land Paris to attend the Computing Live conference. As well as spending 2 days in the Disney and Hollywood studio theme parks. Pupils had presentations from including industry experts cybersecurity who talked about the future of AI, a professor who worked for NASA and used programming to help her investigate the weather in space and Lady Mariame Jamme whose goal is to get 1 million girls to code by 2030.



TeenTech – Alder Hey Children's Hospital

5 students from Year 9 and Year 11 visited Alder Hey Children's Hospital with Mrs Boden to take part in a workshop that focused on 3D printing, showing pupils how they use it within the hospital to plan lifesaving surgeries on patients. They were also involved in a workshop that investigated innovations that could keep patients safe. Our pupils put forward some brilliant ideas such as a pair of glasses that epileptic patients could use while watching films to reduce the chance of seizures and an Amazon Echo type product that reminded patients to take their tables and check how they were recovering from surgery.

Our Geography curriculum

On Monday 20th March we took our Year 11 Geographers into Manchester's city centre to explore the different economic, social, and environmental changes caused by urban change. Students completed environmental surveys, pedestrian counts and had some interesting conversations with tourists and local people walking through Piccadilly Gardens for a questionnaire. Using the data we have collected, Year 11s will now begin to analyse the hypothesis that 'Manchester's urban change has created more opportunities than challenges!'





Following on from our human fieldwork study, we then took our Geographers to Loggerheads Country Park on Wednesday 22nd March. This proved to be a real joy for our students, as they got to walk through the beautiful Welsh woodland to investigate the rushing River Alyn in their waders. We were blessed with clear sunshine and relatively shallow waters to measure the river's width and depth. We can now use the data we collected to evaluate the idea that rivers change as they go from the upper to lower course, hypothetically becoming wider and deeper, with the rocks they carry becoming smaller and smoother gradually.



Our History curriculum

Following on from last half term's commemoration in memory of the victims of the Holocaust, year 9 have been studying historical scholarship and working with witness accounts in an enquiry designed to highlight the outstanding sacrifice and heroism of the people who resisted the Holocaust and fought, against the odds, against Nazi genocide. Pupil engagement and respect for the sensitive nature of the materials we have studied has been outstanding across the year group.

As we continue through our exploration of Medieval worlds, year 7 have been investigating why over half of the population of England was wiped out in the 14th Century. Our budding historians have scrutinised historical scholarship, climate change data from the 14th Century, monastic scripts detailing the events of the Black death and debated the impact Medieval hygiene and sanitation had on life expectancy.

Our Performing Arts curriculum



Our Personal Development and PSHCE curriculum

During this half term in PSHE our students have been focusing on many topics that will prepare our students for life outside of the Academy. In February we were visited by the Brave workshop to introduce our students to the many factors that can contribute to extremism and radicalisation. Following the workshops, pupils were taken to their form rooms. During the form activities, students were invited to delve into more detail into the causes of extremism and radicalisation and how they can gain support.

Students and staff have recently been surveyed on PSHE lessons. 90% of staff find PSHE resources engaging as do 94% of students. The overwhelming majority of students (85%) surveyed said they found our PSHE resources relevant and important to children their age and we are thrilled our PSHE has had such a positive response from students.

We have been continuing to focus on how we should we use respectful language when speaking to each other and the impact of using disrespectful language. This aligns with our Christian values of respect and pride.



Future of work workshop with staff from the Metro Mayors Team

A selection of students from Year 7 - 11 took part in a Future of Work workshop - their feedback will be used help to shape policies and decisions that the team makes to enable the citizens of the city region to access employment opportunities in the years ahead.

Happy Easter! My name is Mrs. Bendall and I am the new attendance officer at school. I joined at the beginning of this half term, and it's been lovely getting to know you all.


